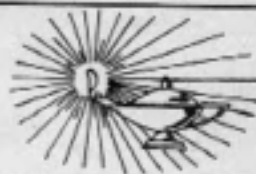

As you leave, we offer you our best wishes and any humble assistance we might be able to render, should you desire it.

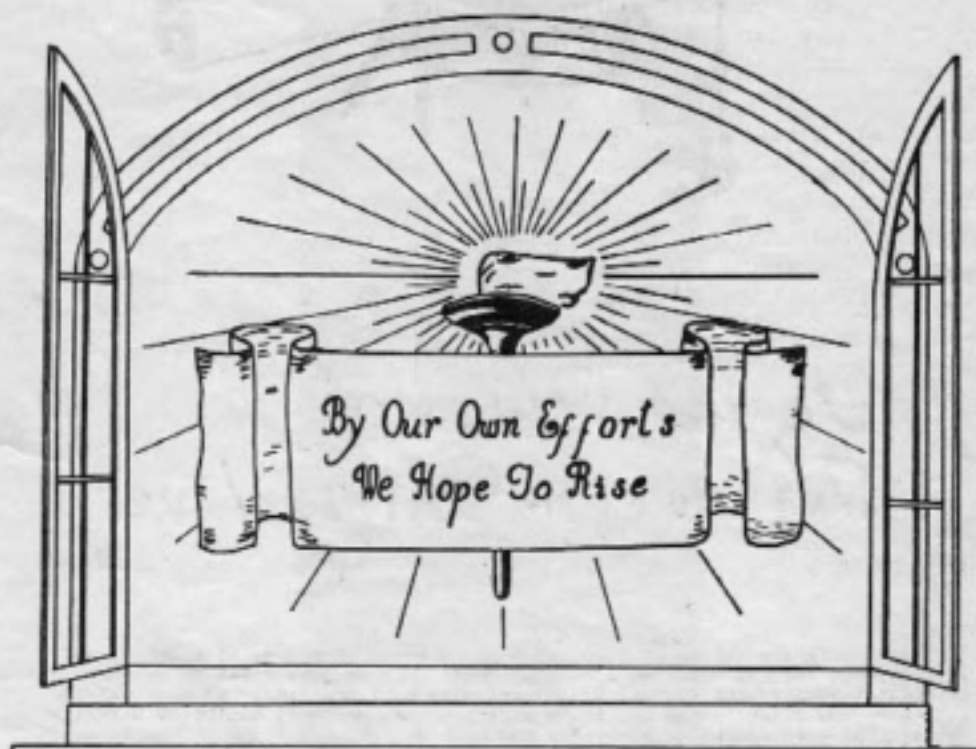

School Fair

The Camptown School and Community Fair has become, from all evidence, an annual affair of great interest and appeal to Camptown and the whole vicinity which the Camptown school serves. Started on a modest scale in the fall of 1932, because of the enthusiasm exhibited, it has been increased in size, variety, and duration each year. The motto has ever been - Bigger and Better Than Before.

Since the Camptown school is a vocational school the students have many projects and productions. The school fair fills a very vital need in furnishing an incentive for worthwhile and outstanding work by providing a place to show the results. It has served as an instructive means to display and demonstrate the work of the school to its many interested friends.

The fair this year, held Friday and Saturday, Sept. 28 and 29, was, as judged from all angles, an outstanding success and an achievement in which all those who worked for, assisted with, or were present at, can justly feel a glow of pride. As has been the custom this fair was under the direction of the Camptown School faculty. Each member had his particular part in the plans which had been carefully worked out in detail. The faithfulness with which these plans were executed, we are proud to say, is a tribute to the splendid example of cooperation shown among the students, teachers, and patrons of the school. Without this unusual spirit of fellowship the unique success of the undertaking would surely have been impossible.

This year as in previous years there was a wide range of entries so that anyone interested, from the young to the old, could take part. There were the customary divisions in farm crops, household products both in foods and clothing, antiques, flowers, art, and several special features. One of these which created wide interest was the display of antique clothes given in the "Parade" held on Friday evening. Many people entered into the spirit of the thing and ransacked attics and old trunks for the fashions of by-gone days. The show brought forth much appreciation as well as entertainment.

It would be very difficult to do justice to an account of the exhibitions. The community hall was truly a wonderland where no one could resist the charm produced by the riot of color and variation of collections from giant corn stalks to baby alligators. One could hardly believe that potatoes could grow so large or that jelly be so clear. Without a question the display of farm produce was exceptional enough to convince the most skeptical of the truth of the sign informing tourists: "Bradford County - the Best Farm Lands of Pennsylvania."

The flower show too deserves special mention. The whole stage was very attractively arranged to show a beautiful collection of flowers and plants of every kind. Certainly everyone admired the display of apples which, because of great variety, were given a booth of their own. Who could look at those apples without feeling his mouth water? And, they not only looked good, but they tasted good! Along with these special features was the novelty booth presented by the Keeler Brothers. Here were found excellent productions of handicraft made and designed by the boys themselves. Probably the most striking articles were the airplane models, boat models, and the Erector truck which was demonstrated and found to be fully equipped.

The judging was done on the basis of 3 points for first place and 1 point for second and third places. Worthwhile prizes were awarded to the man patron, woman patron, high school girl, and high school boy having the highest total points. In addition to these prizes the winner of each division received an attractive ribbon, while other prizes were given to the highest scoring student of each grade.

Along with the exhibitions in the community hall there were special programs both evenings in the school building. These consisted of musical numbers furnished by the school, the fashion show, and addresses by Mr. Reiser and Mr. J. Andrew Morrow. The programs further helped to develop the general theme of the fair.

Besides displaying the work of the school and exhibiting worthwhile articles of all kinds, the community fair offered a good opportunity for bringing people together in a fine spirit of civic meeting where they could discuss common interests, exchange views, and get new ideas. From the splendid manner with which everyone responded in bringing entries there can be no doubt that the fair has had the support and good will of the community. Many were the favorable comments and praises heard on all sides. Several prominent people stated that in their opinions the Camptown School and Community Fair surpassed the Bradford County Fair.

We wish to thank the various clubs of the neighborhood that helped in the support of the fair along with all individuals who gave their assistance. We hope that we may have the same encouraging support in the future.

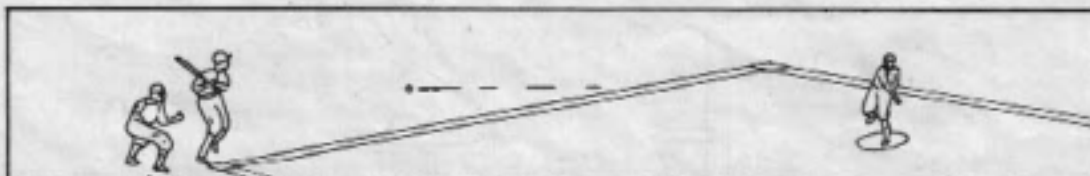
